Our city

São Paulo is huge. Not counting the adjacent towns, its population is estimated at over 11.84 million spread around 1520 km². Founded in 1554, it is the largest city in Brazil, hosting people from all nationalities in over 470 districts.

Safety

You should be safe when walking around the Paulista and Pinheiros neighborhoods, where our suggested accommodations are located. Also, taking the metro, buses, taxis, and Uber is secure. However, beware of pickpockets, which usually aim for mobile phones when people are walking around. Try to keep these devices safely out of reach of strangers. If, by any chance, you are in a situation in which pickpockets threaten you, please do not react and give them what they want. Some of them are under the effects of drugs and can be violent.

Places to visit

The Avenida Paulista

A two-km SW-NE stretch where you can find museums, galleries (small, specialized museums), malls, and various places to eat. <u>https://serieavenidapaulista.com.br/</u>.

It is worth spending a few hours visiting some of the landmarks on this avenue, which becomes a pedestrian zone on Sundays. Starting at the entrances of Metro Stations Paulista-Pernambucanas (Yellow Line) or Consolação (Green Line), we recommend the following stops:

- Instituto Moreira Sales: Art gallery specializing in temporary photography exhibitions and hosting a movie theater. On the first floor, you will find a terrace with a nice view of the entire Paulista Avenue. <u>https://ims.com.br/unidade/sao-paulo/</u>
